

PART II NARRATIVE SULLARY

A. Operations. During the first fourteen days of November, the battalion was engaged in Operation "Nicollet Bay". The primary mission of the battalion was to establish a combat base in forward operating area vic AT929887 in assigned AC and conduct reconngissance in force operations to find, fix and destroy enemy forces, materials and caches. This mission was accomplished by conducting nutually supporting, company size, reconnaissance in force sweeps throughout the assigned AO. From the fifteenth of hovember until the nineteenth of hovember, the battalion rested and rehabilitated in their rear area at Dai la P_0 ss and prepared for Operation "Leade River", scheduled to begin 20 Nov 1968. The mission of the battalion was to move by helicopter to prescribed positions along Route 4 in the southwest sector of the Regimental cordon to capture and/or destroy enemy forces in vicinity of cordon in assigned sector; be grepared on order to conduct screening operations in AO south of the cordon; conduct mobile reserve mission within the area of operations; establish blocking positions during search and destroy operations along the eastern sector of the Dodge City AO. This mission is being accomplished at the present time by maintaining a cordon from the junction of Route 10 and Route 4 and terminating at the junction of Route 4 andthe railroad berm in the Dodge City AO, and also by conducting battalion size search and destroy operations in the assigned areas.

On 01 Nov 68, Alpha Company, at 2345H in vic AT902956, received 02 sniper rounds from vic AT902955. No casualties occurred and the fire ceased after the initial rounds.

On 02 Nov 68, Lima Company, while on a sweep in vic AT 895903, discovered 2 hooches with bunkers. One hooch was 10 x15 and the other was 5 x6. Bunkers surrounded the mooches and were constructed of bamboo, grass, and logs.

On 02 Nov 68, Alpha Company spotted 6 VC/AVA at vic AT939907. They took them under fire with M-79 s, M-14 s, and an 81mm mortar illumination mission. Results were negative.

On 04 Nov 68 at 0900H while on a patrol, Lima 1-A received AK-47 fire from a person appearing to be NVA. He had on green utilities, a green painted hard hat, cartridge belt, and had a new AK-47. L 1-A returned fire with negative results.

On 04 Nov 68 at 0900H, Like Company, while searching area vic AT 85\$900, discovered a bunker complex containing 9 bunkers set up in a defensive position. Approximate dimensions of 1 bunker were 15x15x1; meters. The bunkers were well built and could hold possibly 4 to 5 persons. Two of the bunkers were caved in and all were constructed of wooden logs. Earthern

type bunkers appeared not to have been used recently. While checking out the bunkers, the point man spotted 6 VC/NVA moving south. They were taken under fire with 1-79's and machinesum fire. Results were 2 energy KIA(C). One body had an AK-47, the other a 'willy peter' bag and was dressed in Larine Corps type uniform.

On 04 Nov 68 at 1800H in vic of AT861899, two elements of Nike Company were conducting a check of area and spotted an unknown size enemy force. Anemy was taken under fire, resulting in 1 NVA KIA(C). While pursuing enemy, what appeared to be NVA hooches were discovered. Take was fired on by a light machinegum from a group of hooches from south to west. They continued pursuit with negative results.

On 05 Nov 68 at 0800H in vic of AT875095. 1-2 tried to assault the position but were channeled and did not feel they had a sizable force. 1-2 fell back and joined the rest of hike Company. Note: It appeared that the enemy was conducting a delaying tactic in order to enable a larger unit to move out.

On 05 Nov 68 at 0900H in vic of AT862885, hike Company, while approaching assigned objectives, received small arms fire from ridge line. Like returned fire on the enemy and then proceeded to the top of the ridge line to secure it. Upon securing the ridge, the enemy withdrew in a south-southwest direction. Like searched the immediate area and found 2 large living quarters which could hold possibly 25 people along with 1 smaller hooch which could hold 10 people. Also found were: 1 messnall, 1 classroom, 2 Chi-Coms, 1 AK-47 megazine, all type of clothing, 3 hVA packs, 1 large cross-cut saw and 3 smaller cross-cut saws which had recently been used.

On 05 Nov 68 at 0900H in vic of AT874893, bal, while approaching highground, received small arms fire of 20 to 30 rounds from the top of a ridge line 100 meters up a very steep slope. In 1 deployed immediately and assaulted the object on the highground. Found were 15 fighting holes, 3 to 5 feet deep and uncovered; they appeared to have been constructed approximately a week before. The fighting holes looked like a highly sophisticated complex set up as a barracks designed to hold 100 men. The most prominent hopen was 65 meters long and 35 meters wide and included a sleeping area, messmall and a classroom whenches and a blackboard. Inside, a tunnel complex was discovered which contained clothing, 3 full NVA packs, documents of all types, money, propaganda leaflets, and medical sup, lies. A further search of the area revealed a Cr type hooch which contained a set of field glasses with multi-colored lenses, possibly infrared. Toward the northwest, 5 hore booches were found which had been recently lived in because panties, bras, and cloth Kotex items were discovered in small quantities. The search went without incident; medevacs were called and as they were approaching, took heavy volumes of fire from an unknown position. The barracks complex and all gear, excluding the documents,

were destroyed by burning. Results were 2 Chi-Com grenades and 1 AK-47 magazine captured and 1 USAC WIA.

On 05 Nov 68 at 1945H, Alpha-1 in vic of AT908943, received sniper fire from vic of AT910948. Illumination and a fire mission were called with unknown results.

On 06 Nov 68 at 0800H, kike Company deployed from night position with two elements up and one element back. Unit came under automatic weapons fire from a well constructed position 75 meters away, vic of AT873896. Artillery was adjusted on suspected nortar position and enemy locations. Fortar rounds ceased after initial arty mission. Found were log hooches 20 feet long, 10 feet wide, and 12 feet high. They appeared to be sleeping quarters. Four graves were uncovered which contained the bodies of 4 males who had been dead for approximately one nonth. The results of this action were 6 USFC WIA, 2 USFC NBC, 5 NVA KIA(C). A tally of gear found was: 1 AK-47, 4 AK-47 megazines, 1 cylindrical megazine, and 2 AK-47 megazine pouches. Also found were: 2 1001b bags of rice, 5 bottles of penecillin (made by the Liliplex Corp. Line USA), 1 keresene lentern and assorted can goods.

On 06 Nov 68 at 1145H, Lima Company in vic of AT892873, found two graves with one body in each. Bodies appeared to be 3 weeks old.

On 06 Nov 68 at 1845H, Mike's defensive perimeter received 20-25 rounds of 60mm or 82mm morter fire which resulted in 4 minor WlA's. There was no counter battery and defensive fire brought to bear on the suspected enemy location.

On 07 Nov 68 at 1145H, hike Company, while running a routine search of the area vic AT873697, discovered the following gear: 5 pounds of TNT in half-pound blocks, 3 Chi-Com grenades (pineapple type), 173 1-16 rounds, 53 SKs rounds, 300 AK-47 rounds which were new and 276 that were old but still usable and 3 30.06 rounds. Later in the day at 1800H in vic of AT874897, Mike Company found a well-built booch measuring 25x50x12 feet. A search of the area uncovered 42 1001b bags of white rice. A closer investigation of the nooch revealed 5001bs of white rice under a false floor.

At 1300H, 08 Nov 68, Lima-1, moving in the assault in vic of AT869905, received heavy enemy fire. Lima-1 and Lima-2 continued the assault and swept over the ridge. Results were 1 Unic Kla.

At 1530H, 08 Nov 68, Idma-1, while on a sweep in vic of AT873899, found 08 well-constructed hooches which contained the following VC/NVA gear: 7 RFG's with boosters, 7 Chi-Com grenades, 10 Ak Lagazines, 2100 AK rounds, 100 feet of detonating cord, 160 electrical blasting caps with wire, 75 non-electrical blasting caps, 25lbs of TNT, 45lbs of rice, 8 packs, 150lbs of clothing, 15 VC/NVA uniforms, 1 foxnole cover (U.S. type), various medical equipment, 1 messmall 40x15 feet, 5 fighting holes, 7 hooches, 3 bunkers spearate away from hooches and many documents.

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At 0830H on 10 Nov 68, Like Company spotted 01 VC/hVA coming up the trail yelling "Chieu Hoi." The harines neld fire and waited for the Chieu Hoi to approach them when 02 VC/hVA jumped up and sprayed the area with 1-16 and AK-47 fire. The harines returned fire and enveloped the position from the right. Results were 01 VC/LVA KIA(C); 01 Usic KIA and 03 Usic WIA.

At 1500H, 09 Nov 68, hike Company, while conducting a routine search during patrolling activities at vic of AT674899, discovered 01 nomemade claymore mine 1x1 feet by 4 inches with rock and concrete explosive inside, 01 blasting cap non-electric pressure type, 1cc bottle of Atrophene, 01 bottle of Red Chinese medicine, 85lbs of rock salt, 500lbs of white rice and various documents. The rice was found under floors covered with 5 to 6 inches of dirk. 300lbs was found in one mooch, 100lbs in another, and 100lbs in still another. The rice and rock salt were destroyed by spreading it through a stream bed; the documents and medicine were turned over to the S-2.

At 1230H, 10 Nov 68 in vic of AT863894, Mike Company discovered a complex of hooches which contained the following items: 03 RrG Horounds, 01 Chi-Com grenade, 285 AK rounds, 10 non-electric blasting caps, 10 electric blasting caps, 03 AK magazines, 01 canteen, 01 cartridge belt, 02 first aid pouches with accessories, assorted NVA clothing, 50 pounds of brown rice and assorted cooking utensils.

On 20 Nov 68 at 1125H in vic AT994577, Kilo discovered a boobytrap. Ingineers were called to the scene and in an attempt to disarm the boobytrap, it was accidentally detonated, wounding one Farine.

On 20 Nov 68 at 2030h in vic of AT986584, Kilo-3 received incoming sniper fire and grenades from an unknown origin. Suppressive fire was fired into the area and contact was broken.

On 20 Nov 68 at 2305H in the vic of AT 86584, one of Kilo's machinegunners spotted several enemy personnel and took them under fire. One of the enemy was seen to fall and a sweep of the area revealed large pools of blood, a magazine for an AK-47 and two Chi-Com grenades.

On 21 Nov 68 at 0000H in the vic of AT987584, Kilo received 03 rounds of 60m morter fire. A counter morter fire mission was fired and the incoming ceased.

On 21 Nov 68, India Company received 03 rounds from vic of AT987584. Artillery was called in on the enemy position and the Lortar fire ceased. No casualties were taken by india.

On 22 Nov 68 at 0800H. India Company spotted 02 VC/NVA at vic AT989584. The enemy was brough under 1-79 fire with unknown results.

On 22 Nov 68 at 1910H, Kilo Company heard movement at vic of AT982583 and fired a pop-up illumination. Two VC were spotted running into a tree line. 1-79 fire was brought on the enemy with unknown results.

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On 22 Nov 68 at 2110H, India received heavy automatic weapons fire. India returned suppressive fire and the enemy broke contact. Results: 01 USAC KIA.

On 22 how 68 at 2330H, India Company spotted movement in vic of AT988583 and fired small arms into the area. One enemy was seen to fall as a result of the fire.

On 23 mov 68 at 1200H in the vic of #7989589, Lima Company, while moving into a blocking position took fire from an estimated 08 to 12 enemy personnel dug-in near a small building. The enemy was taken under fire and Lima attempted to manuever into position to take the fortification. Unable to obtain a favorable attack posture, Lima decided to pull back and evacuate casualties before attempting to assault the position again. Results of the action: 04 USAC KIA; 03 USAC WIA; 04 WC/LVA KIA(C).

On 23 Nov 68 at 1800H in the vic of AT989585, Lima Company, while moving to tie-in with hotel Company, came under intensive machinegum and small arms fire. The size of the enemy force was estimated to be 08 to 10 men with AK-47°s, a machinegum and possibly a mortar. Fire was returned with 60mm mortars, 1-60 machinegums, 1-79°s, and 81mm mortars. Results: 04 Usic WIA.

On 23 Nov 68 at 2220n in vic of AT989578, India Company received several rounds of small arms fire. Fire was returned with 1-79 and 01 VC/HV. was seen to fall.

On 24 Nov 68 at 1200H in the vic of AT984590, Kilo's lead element came upon an open area and observed several hooches and bunkers. After preping the area with 1-79's, LAAW's and 60mm Fortar fire, Kilo moved on through the area to establish contact with Hotel Company. The hooches were checked cut and found to contain 1-79 ammunition, AK-47 ammunition, LAAW's, 782 gear, 200 lbs of rice, Chi-Com grenades and civilian clothing. Two USAC personnel received minor wounds from a boobytrap in one of the hooches.

On 24 Nov 68 at 1305H, an aerial observer spotted 06 VC in a treeline, vic of AT986564. An artillery mission was fired into the treeline and the AO confirmed 06 VC XIn.

On 24 Nov 68 at 1600H, Kilo Company jumped off in a coordinated attack with Hotel Company. Hotel moved to their front approximately 200 meters when their right flank came under heavy sniper fire. Kilo moved their left element forward in an attempt to tie-in with Hotel and relieve the pressure on Hotel's right flank. Kilo's left element was unable to tie-in with Hotel because of dense jumgle foilage and enemy fire to their direct front and left rear. Kilo-2 was then moved up on the left units right flank in an attempt to move into position to envelope the enemy position. Heavy fire from Kilo's direct front made an envelopment impossible. Kilo-3 was taken out of reserve and moved to the left flank of Kilo-1 in order to clear out the sniper fire from the left rear and tie-in with Hotel Company. Once contact was established with Hotel, Kilo held that position. Results: 02 Unic Kla; 16 Unic Wila.

On 26 Nov 68 at 0900H in vic of AT989585, Kilo Company, while sweeping the area, found 01 grave with body. Cause of death was undertermined and was believe to have occurred one to two days before. A search of the immediate area revealed 01 Chi-Com grenade, 02 E-tools, 02 AK-47 magazines with ammunition, 01 cartridge belt with magazine, 01 poncho with blood stains, 01 rainsuit and 01 small bag of rice.

On 26 how 68 at 2120H in vic of AT985584, Kilo received 02 RrG rounds, 02 Chi-Com grenades and small arms. Small arms were returned and the incoming ceased. Results: 03 USAC WIA.

On 26 Nov 68 at 0330H in vic of AT992557, the battalion CP, India, and Kilo Companies received incoming rockets or artillery for approximately 45 minutes. Results: 01 UseC KIA, 04 WSEC WIA.

On 27 Nov 68 at 1015H in vic of AT988556, Kilo Company, while on a sweep north with India Company, nad one of their scout dogs alert on their left flank. An element was sent into the treeline to investigate and spotted 02 VC running toward a bunker complex in the treeline. Kilo opened fire on the two enemy, killing one of them. The other VC escaped to the west. A check of the hunker system revealed signs of recent use, chow was still on the pround.

On 27 Nov 68 at 1200H in vic of AT987558, Kilo, while sweeping through the area, came under neavy fire from their left flank. Kilo-2 assaulted the position causing the enemy to break contact and flee to the west. Results: 09 UNAC WIA; 05 VC/NVA KIA(C); 03 AK-47's captured and 01 plastic bag of miscellaneous documents.

On 27 kov 68 at 1700H in vic of AT984568, Kilo-2, moving to the west to clear the bunker complex they had assaulted earlier, made contact with the enemy again. Four of the enemy were observed running in a westerly direction and were brought under fire. Three of the enemy were hit and a search of the bunker complex was conducted. Results: 03 VC/AVA KIA(C); 01 SES captured; 01 55 gallon drum of rice captured, miscellaneous 782 gear and documents captured.

On 27 Nov 68 at 1545H in vic of AT993568, India Company tripped a boobytrap, wounding three marines.

On 28 Nov 68 at 1155H in vic of AT980566, Kilo, while sweeping through the area, found 02 graves which contained 02 bodies approximately 1 to 2 days old. They were wearing NVA type uniforms and appeared to be killed by an air strike. Results: 02 LVA KIA(C).

On 28 Nov at 1230H, Kilo, while sweeping area in vic of AT978570, encountered a bunker complex which appeared to have been used as hospital facilities. A thorough search of the area revealed: bandages, medical supplies, 40 lbs of rice, NVA 782 gear and 06 2.75 rockets. All of the gear was destroyed.

On 28 Now at 1705H, Kilo, sweeping area in vic of AT973570, found a bunker complex at vic of AT975575. Also found at vic of AT974575, was a rice cache which contained 500lbs of rice, a pilot survival radio, clothes, tools and eating utensils. The rice and bunkers were destroyed and the relaining gear was brought in to S-2.

On 29 Nov 68 at 1530H, India Company Command Post, while sweeping area in vic of 17985575, tripped a boobytrap of an unknown type causing it to detonate. Results: 10 USC WIA.

On 29 Nov 68 at 2029H in vic of BT002566, a KI from Kilo Company spotted 04 VC coming towards them. The KT sprung the ambush, the energy broke contact and fled mouth. Results are unknown.

On 30 Mov at 1230H, Kilo Company, while sweeting area in vic of BT008565; found 08 bunkers, a turnel and assorted 782 gear. Also found were 03 bodies missing from a Recon team. Results: various clothing, medical supplies, 02 blasting caps, VC documents, 261 AK-47 rounds, and 1251bs of corn were captured. The bunkers and the tunnel were destroyed and the aumo was blown.

On 30 Nov at 2045H, a Li from Kilo Company spotted 02 VC coming toward their position at vic of BT003568. The Li vaited until the enemy were 15 meters from their position and opened up with small arms fire. One VC went down and the other one broke contact and ran toward the north. Results: 01 VC KIA(C).

Bo Administration. During the period 1-30 hovember 1968, the 3-1 administration was set up in the Danang area, established at Camp Furdue; this included the Battalion \$-1. Sick-Bey Administration and the Company offices. Even though the Companies were geographically separated with the administration set up, (battalion functioned operationally at the Rock-Crusher), administration functioned smoothly and little or no difficulty existed in the operation of administrative procedures.

C. Intelligence.

1. From 1-14 Rovember the enemy situation in the 3/26 AO Operation Nicollet Bay centers around two Sapper Battalions operating southwest of Hai Van Pass. One of these battalions, the Truong Son Sapper Bn, is a MVA force located vic AT9080 with an estimated strength of 250 men. The T87 Sapper Bn is a AF unit located vic AT9292 with an estimated strength of 350 men.

From 15-19 November - Order of Battle from the Ill AF reriodic Intelligence Report states that there has been no intelligence reports indicating any enemy units in the 3/26 Danang AO at this time.

From 20-30 hovember the enemy situation in Operation Leade River was 150 to 350 hVA/AFVC and 70 local VC. The strength figure is predicted on one battalion and local units operating in the AO. Enemy forces operating in the AO consist of elements of the 38th Regiment and local forces of the quang Da Spec Sector. Elements of the 38th Regt operating in the AO are the R-20 Bn vic BTO34609 and support elements of the T89 Sapper Bn. The Q82 Company, VC local force and the X16 Company vic BTO00606 has also been reported in the AO.

2. From 1-14 November the mission of the Trueng Son and T87 Sapper In in the AO, Operation Nicollet Bay is to harass Army engineers working along Route 11: also to destroy bridges and culverts along Route 11:

From 15-19 November the mission of the enemy in the 3/26 Danang AO seemed to be of a passive nature, on a whole the enemy has avoided contact using only minor herassing tactics. The local force in the AO has the capability of conducting minor attacks by fire, use of mines, booby traps and harassing fire, with a few isolated ground probes of night defensive positions. He also has the capability of conducting attacks by fire with mortar, 140mm or 122mm rocets in conjunction with or separately from ground attacks.

From 20-30 November the mission of the enemy in Operation Leade River was to attack U.S. and allied units in and around the area known as Dodge City. Also to support rocket attacks on Dansag and Hoi Ann and support the village and hamlet infrastructure.

3. From 1-14 November the mission of 3/26 Operation Nicollet Bay was to find, fix and destroy the enemy operating within the Nicollet Bay AU.

From 19-30 kovember Operation Reade River commenced. The mission of the 3d Bn, 26th Larines was to capture and/or destroy enemy forces. Conduct screening operations in the AO; conduct mobile reserve missions within the area of operations; establish blocking positions during search and destroy operations along the sector of the modge City AO. In conjunction with ARVN, PFF, and FRU elements, search and clear villages and adjacent areas to destroy enemy forces, caches, materials and installations and to capture VC infrastructure.

4. On 100830H, Marines on "M" Company's perimeter spotted 1 W/MVA coming up trail yelling "Chieu Hoi!" As marines waited for enemy to approach, two other WC/MVA jumped up and fired on marines. Chieu Hoi also returned fire on Marines. Perimes returned fire killing 1 WC/MVA.

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On 211200H, "K" Company vic AT987558, while sweeping through area came under heavy fire. K-2 attacked enemy position causing enemy to break contact and flee to the west. Contact resulted in 5 VC/LVA KIA(C), 3 Cni-Com grenades, 3 AK-47's, 2 AK magazines w/armo, 1 pair utilities, 1 set of civilian clotning and documents.

On 271700H, "K" Company vic AT984568 observed 4 VC running toward a bunker complex in tree-line. Fired on energy resulting in 3 VC KTA(C). Search of bunker complex revealed 782 gear, 55 gallon drum of rice, 5 Chi-Com grenades, medical supplies, documents and 1 SKS rifle.

On 281230H, "K" Company vic AT978570 discovered bunker complex which appeared to be used for hospital facilities. Search of complex revealed bandages, medical supplies, 401bs of rice, NV: 782 gear, 6 2.75 rockets.

On 281705H, "I" Company found bunker complex vic \$7975575. Discovered 500lbs of rice, 100lbs corn (husked).

5. Weather: For the month of movember there was at mean temperature of 80°, a high of 88°, and a low of 72°. There were light intermittent showers during the day and night throughout the month. The total precipitation for the month was 13.72 inches. The relative humidity was 84%

6. Terrain: From 1-14 Movember on Operation Micollet Bay in the 3/26 AU the terrain was composed of a mountainous area ranging as high as 1000 meters with double and triple canopy jungle.

From 15-19 November, the battalion was back in the Dai La Pass cantonment. The terrain in the Danang AC is very irregular with the elevation averaging around 800 meters. The vegetation consists of very thick brush and elephant grass. There are also man different types of trees ranging in height from 4 to 30 feet. Water is plentiful in the valleys but scarce on the high ground.

From 20-30 November, the battalion jumped off on Operation reade River. The terrain encountered consists mainly of flat fertide lowlands covered by cultivated rice fields. These rice fields are generally double cropped causing them to be inundated the major part of the year. Soils consist of light to heavy clay and there are no critical terrain features. The old railroad bern on Route #10 is a dominate terrain feature.

7. Avenues of Approach: From 1-14 hovember in the 3/26 hicollet Bay AO, there are two avenues of approach. In the southern portion of the AO the Little elephent Valley (AT8485) forms the main avenue of approach. In the northern portion of the AO the ridgeline at vic AT9091, which runs west to east to the Hai Van rass forms the other avenue of approach.

From 20-30 November in the Operation Leade River AO, the valley at vic 201754 and the Bong Vu Gia River running from a west to east direction provides a good avenue of approach. Another good avenue of approach is the song Thu Bon River vic AT9253, which runs in a north easterly direction to the operation AO.

F. Fire Support. In the Hieu Duc AC, supporting arms were used offensively during the month. Extensive nighttime and daytime HAI fires were plotted daily. In addition, 22 preparation fires were fired in support of ground operations. Forter suppression missions were coordinated with the 26th and 1st Marines through the ALO and NGF was used in the support and the supplementation of all supporting arms rolls. The battalion maintained fire plans and provided fire support for CAr units in the AO and ARVN engineering teams constructing rocket barriers.

G. Logistics.

- 1. General. Logistical support was satisfactory during the month of November. Transportation and food service were satisfactory. General supply was adequate, except for existing short supply of some items of monsoon gear.
- a. Transportation was furnished by 1st Motor Transport Battalion with satisfactory results.
- b. Resupply and troop movements have been accomplished by 1st hotor Transport Battalion and helicopters during the north of November.
- c. Maintenance support was furnished by FLC and 1st FSR, Daning. Maintenance support has been adequate during this reporting period.

H. Communication.

1. Radio. During the period 1-14 hovember on Operation hicollet Bay, all radio nets terminated in command LVT's in the field. A guard radio was maintained at Hill 24. and remoted into the battalion rear at the Rock Crusher site. From 14-20 November, all radio nets were remoted

into the Rock Crusher from Hill 244. From 20-30 November, the battalion maintained internal radio nets and external radio nets with Alpha Command Group, 1st harines, during Operation heade River. During this period a relay site was established at Hill 55 and a guard was maintained at the Rock Crusher on 1st marines Regt. TAC, Battalion TAC and Battalion Admin.

- 2. Message Center. Lessage traffic is picked up and delivered to the 26th Marines Communication Center. Message pick-ups were made twice a day unless a high priority message required instant pick-up and then a special run was made. The adjutant section is responsible for distribution.
- 3. <u>Wire/Radio Relay</u>. During the period 1-14 Movember, a radio relay link was established between Hill 244 and the battalion in the field, using TRC-27's. This enabled us to maintain a CCC Hot Line to regiment as well as a FCCC Hot Line. One common user line went to the regimental switchboard and one common user line went into the battalion rear switchboard. Normal phone service was maintained at the battalion rear.
 - 4. General. There were no equipment losses due to enemy action.

I. Ledical Dental.

- 1. <u>Personnel</u>. This Battalion Aid Station has a total of 60 personnel, consisting of 57 Hospital Corpsmen and two hedical Officers.
- 2. Capabilities. This Battalion Aid Station was capable of treating all minor medical and surgical problems. Patients requiring more extensive care were evacuated to 1st hedical Battalion, NSA Danang, or the USS Rarosm. At the present one hardback is being utilized for the BAS and one tent for hedical supply, which are adequate. The BAS is responsible for evacuating seriously injured or ill patients from the operation site.
- 3. Training. Hospital Corpsman receive classroom training and on the job training under supervision of the Battalion Surgeon and the Chief Hospital Corpsman on field medical technique and diagnostic procuedures.
- 4. <u>Dental</u>. Dental facilities are now available and provided by the 1st Dental Company. On board are one Dental Corps Officer and one Dental Corpsman.
- 5. <u>releria Prophylagia</u>. Chloraquine-Frimaquine tablets were taken once a week, preferably with Sunday meal.
- 6. <u>Sanitation</u>. Sanitation reports were made weekly to the Battalion Commander and smould be referred to.



The enemy withdrew as hike approached the top of the ridge. While conducting a search of the area, hike discovered 2 large living quarters which could hold possibly 25 persons and 1 smaller hooch which could hold possibly 10 persons. Found were: 1 messhall, 1 classroom, 2 Chi-Com's, 1 AK-47 magazine, all types of documents, propaganda leaflets, clothing and 4 saws.

Morthwest of the bunker complex, 5 more hooches were found that appeared to have been lived in recently because panties, bras and cloth Kotex items were discovered in small quantities. Results: 1 USIC VIA, 2 Chi-Com*s and 1 AK-47 megazine.

06 November 1968

At 0800H, kike Company came under automatic weapons fire from a well constructed position at vic of AT873096. Artillery was adjusted on suspected enemy positions and enemy fire ceased. Found were log howches 20 feet long, 10 feet wide and 12 feet migh. Four graves were also discovered which contained the bodies of 4 males dead for approximately one month. 
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

7. Sup orting Forces.


8. Intelligence.

a. The enemy situation in the Nicollet Bay AU centers ground two Sapper Battalions operating southwest of the Hai Van Pass. The Truong Son Sapper Bn is recorded as an NVA force with an estimated strength of 250 men, and according to latest intelligence reports is located at AT9080. The other is the T87 Sapper Bn, a main force battalion with an estimated strength of 350 men located at AT9292.

b. Enemy strength The Truong Son Sapper Bn is recorded as an NVA force with an estimated strength of 250 men. The current probable location of the Truong Son En is AT9000. The Te7 Sapper En is a Main Force Unit with an estimated strength of 350 men. Its current probable location is at AT9292. The armament of these two battalions is unknown; however, it is known, by contacts with the enemy throughout the operation, that they have 60mm and 82mm mortars, light machineguns, 1279's, RFG's, at least one .50 caliber machinegum, AK-47's, TMT w/blasting caps and detonation cord.


c. Enemy Mission

The Mission of the Truong Son and T87 Sapper Battalions is to harrass Army ingineers and to destroy bridges and culverts along Route #1.

d. Significant Events

- (1) On 040900H, "A" Company at vic AT859900 discovered a bunker complex which consisted of 9 bunkers. One was large enough for 15-20 persons. Aight bunkers were large enough for 4-5 persons each. While searching area, point man spotted 6 VC/NVA moving south. He fired on the enemy resulting in 2 VC/NVA KIA. Captured were 1 AK-47, 2 AK-47 magazines w/amme and 2 Chi-Com grenades.
- (2) On 060800H, "M" Company at vic ATS73695, while sweeping VC/NVA living area, received AWF and 10 rds 60mm or 82mm mortar fire from estimated 10-12 enemy well armed. "M" Company called for arty on suspected enemy mortar position which ceased enemy fire. Search of area revealed four graves with four VC/NVA bodies. Later, "M" Company's ambush made contact with an unknown size enemy force which resulted in 1 VC/NVA KIA. Captured were 1 AK-47, 4 AK-47 magazines, 5 Chi-Com granades and a total of 5 VC/NVA KIA.
- (3) On 081530H, "L" Company, while sweeping area vic AT873899, found 8 well constructed hooches which contained 7 RPG rounds with boosters, 7 Chi-Com grenades, 10 AK magazines, 2100 AK-47 rounds, 100 feet of detonating cord, 160 electrical blasting caps, 25lbs TNT, 45lbs of rice, 150lbs of clothing including 15 VC/NVA uniforms and various items of medical equipment. In this area "L" Company also found 1 messnall 40 x15', 7 hooches with bunkers, three bunkers separated from the hooches and many documents.
- (4) On 100830H, Marines on "M" Company's perimeter spotted 1 VC/NVA coming up the trail yelling "Chieu Hoi!" As Earines weited for enery to approach, two other VC/NVA jumped up and fired on Marines with M-16 and AK-47. Chieu Hoi also returned fire on Marines. Enemy broke contact and fled. Search of area revealed 1 VC/NVA KIA.
- (5) On 101230H, "M" Company, at vic AT863894, discovered a hosch complex which had been burned and reconstructed. Discovered were 285 AK rounds, 10 non-electrical blasting caps, 10 electrical blasting caps, 3 AK megazines, 50lbs of rice and 3 RFG rounds.
- e. Weather
 There was a mean temperature of 78°, a nich of 86° and a low of 70°. There were light intermittent showers during the day and night throughout the operation.



11. Execution.

With the issuance of 25th Marines Frago 35-68 250800H Oct68, this Battalion commenced an operation which, at a later date, was given the code name Nicellet Bay (26th Mar Frago 39-68 081544H Nov68). This report includes a summary of the entire operation from the 25th of Oct68 to the 14th of Nov68. The following is a chronological listing of significant events.

On 30 Oct 68 at 0955H, India Company in vic AF910908, found one radio sound modulator 1-2100/AMT-4B w/att transmittor radio sound T-435 AMP-AB.

On 31 Oct 68 at 1200H India Company, while moving to an objective, came upon 4 VO/NVA in the process of slaughtering a Rock Ape vic AT901913. The VC/NVA escaped into the jungle leaving behind the following gear: 1 VC pack containing 1 bag of salt and peppers, 1 bag of rice, 1 surgical shirt, 3 fresh dried pieces of megt, 1 bottle of keroseme, 1 bag of cooked rice, 1 toothbrush and toothpaste, 2 blasting caps, 1 canteen cover, 1 belt, 1 plastic tarp, 3 feet of nylon cord, 1 utility shirt, 2 cloth bags, 1 hVA pair of khaki trousers, 1 pair of green trousers w/belt, 1 harmock, 1 mosquito net, 1 section of parachute cloth, 2 make shift packs, 1 cloth bag.

On 31 Oct 68 at 1830H, A-1, while on patrol in vic AT914934. tripped a booby trapped CS grenade. No injuries were incurred and the patrol continued after the CS was clear of the area.

On O1 Nov 68, Alpha Company, et 2345H in vic AT902956, received 02 sniper rounds from vic AT902955. No casualties occurred and the fire ceased after the initial rounds.

On O2 Nov 68, Lime Company, while on a sweep in vio AT895903. discovered 2 nooches with bunkers. One hooch was 10 x15 and the other was 5 m. Bunkers murrounded the no other and were constructed of bamboo, grass, and logs.

On 02 Nov 68, Alpha Company spotted 6 VC/NVA at vic AT939907. They took them under fire with M-79's, M-14's and an 81mm morter illumination mission. Results were negative.


On O4 Nov 68 at 0900H while on a patrol, Lima 1-A received AK-47 fire from a person appearing to be NVA. He had on green utilities, green painted hard hat, cartridge belt, and had a new AK-47. Li-A returned fire with negative results.

On 04 Nov 68 at 0900H, Mike Company, while searching area vic AT858900, discovered a bunker complex containing 9 bunkers set up in defensive positions. Approximate dimensions of 1 bunker were 15x15x15 meters. The bunkers were well built and could hold possibly 4 to 5 persons. Two bunkers were caved in and all were constructed of wooden logs. Earthern type bunkers appeared not to have been used recently. While checking out the bunkers, the point man spotted 6 WC/NVA moving south. They were taken under fire with N-79's and machinegun fire. Results were 2 enemy KIA(C). One body had an AK-47, the other a 'willy peter bag and was dressed in Marine Corps type uniform.

On 04 Nov 68 at 1800H in vic of AT861899, two elements of hike Company were conducting a check of grea and spotted an unknown size enemy force. Ememy was taken under fire, resulting in 1 NVA KlA(C). While pursuing enemy, what appeared to be NVA hooches were discovered. hike was fired on by a light machinegun from a group of hooches from south to west. They continued pursuit with negative results.

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On 05 Nov 68 at 0800H in vic of AP(15895, 1...2, while moving easterly toward 5 or 6 houches, received a heavy volume of fire from an unknown number of enemy that were set up to their direct front. It appeared that the enemy had 1 automatic weapon and some smaller weapons. It are tried to assault the position but were channeled and did not feel they had a sizable force. In 2 fell back and joined the rest of Mike Company. Note: It appeared that the enemy was conducting a delaying tactic in order for a larger unit to move out.


On 05 Nov 68 at 0900H in vic of AT862885, Nike Company, while approaching assigned objectives, received small arms fire from ridge line. Nike returned the fire on the enemy and then proceeded to the top of the ridge to secure it. Upon securing the ridge, the enemy withdrew in a south-southwest direction. Nike searched the immediate area and found 2 large living quarters which could hold possibly 25 people along with 1 smaller hooch which could house 10 people. Also found were: 1 messhall, 1 classroom, 2 Chi-Coms, 1 AK-47 magazine, all types of documents, diaries, and propaganda leaflets, 3 French campaign helmets, all types of clothing, 3 NVA packs, 1 large cross-cut saws and 3 small cross-cut saws which had recently been used.

On 05 Nov 68 at 0900H in vic of AT874893, N-1, while approaching highground, received small grms fire of 20 to 30 rounds from the top of a ridge line 100 meters up a very steep slope. In deployed immediately and assaulted the object on the high ground. Found were 15 fighting holes 3 to 5 feet deep and uncovered; they appeared to have been constructed approximately a week before. The fighting noles looked like a highly sophisticated complex set up as a barracks designed to hold 100 men. The most prominent hooch was 65 meters long and 35 meters wide and included a sleeping area, messhall, and a classroom w/benches and a black board. Inside, a tunnel complex was discovered which contained clothing, 3 full NVA packs, documents of all types, money, propaganda leaflets, and medical supplies. A further search of the area revealed a CF type hooch which contained a set of field glasses with multi-colored lenses, possibly infrared. Toward the northwest, 5 more hooches were found which had been recently lived in because panties, bras, and cloth Kotex items were discovered in small quantities. The search went without incident; medevacs were called and as they were approaching took heavy volumes of fire from an unknown position. The barracks complex and all gear, excluding the documents, were destroyed by burning. Results were 2 Chi-Com grenades and 1 AK-47 magazine captured and 1 USAC WIA.

On 05 Nov 68 at 1945H, A-1 in vic of AT908943, received sniper fire from vic of AT910948. Illumination and a fire mission were called with unknown results.

on 06 Nov 68 at 0000, kike Company deployed from night position with two elements up and one element back. Unit came under automatic weapons fire from a well constructed position 75 meters away, vic of AT873896. Artillery was adjusted on suspected morter position and enemy locations. Morter rounds ceased after initial arty mission. Found were log hooches 20 feet long, 10 feet wide, and 12 feet high. They appeared to be sleeping quarters. Four graves were uncovered which contained the bodies of 4 males who had been dead for approximately one month. The results of this action were 6 USAC WIA, 2 USAC MBC, 5 MVA KIA(C). A tally of gear found was: 1 AK-47, 4 AK-47 magazines, 1 cylindrical magazine, and 2 AK-47 magazine pouches. Also found were: 2 1001b bags of rice, 5 bottles of penecillin (made by the Liliplex Corp. Line USA), 1 kerosene lantern, and assorted can goods.

On 06 Nov 68 et 1145H, Line Company in vic of AT892873, found two graves with one body in each. Bodies appeared to be 3 weeks old.

On 06 Nov 68 at 1200H, Mike Company in vic of AT873896, spotted two enemy moving to the northwest along the highground. The enemy were seen carrying packs but no weapons were sighted. They were taken under fire with negative results.

On 06 Nov 68 at 1845H, hike's defensive perimeter received 20-25 rounds of 60mm or 82mm morter fire which resulted in 4 minor WIA's. There was no counter battery and defensive brought to bear on suspected enemy location.

On 07 Nov 68 at 1145H, Mike Company, while running a routine search of the area vic AT873897, discovered the following gear: 5 pounds of ThT in half pound blocks, 3 Chi-Com grenades (pineapple type), 173 M-16 rounds, 53 SKs rounds, 300 AK-47 rounds which were new and 276 that were old but still usable, and 3 30.06 rounds. Later in the day at 1800H in vic of AT874897, hike Company found a well built hooch measuring 25x50x12 feet. A search of the area uncovered 42 100lb bags of white rice. A closer investigation of the holch revealed 500lbs of white rice under a false floor.

At 1300H, 08 Nov 68, Lima 1, moving in the assault in vic of AT869905, received heavy enemy fire. Lima 1 and Lima 2 continued the assault and swept over the ridge. Results were 1 USIC KIA.

At 1530H, 08 Nov 68, Lima 1, while on a sweep in vic of AT873899, found 08 well built hooches which contained the following VC/NVA gear: 7 RPG's with boosters, 7 Chi-Com grenades, 10 AK megazines, 2100 AK rounds, 100 feet of detonating cord, 160 electrical blasting caps with wire, 75 non-electrical blasting caps, 25lbs TNT, 45lbs of rice, 8 packs, 150lbs of clothing, 15 VC/NVA uniforms, 1 foxhole cover (U.S. type), various medical equipment, 1 messhall 40x15 feet, 5 fighting holes, 7 hooches, 3 bunkers separate away from hooches, and many documents.

At 0830H on 10 Nov 68, Mike Company spotted 01 VC/NVA coming up the trail yelling "Chien Hoi". The harines held fire and waited for the Chien Hoi to approach them when 02 VC/NVA jumped up and sprayed the area with 1-16 and AK-47 fire. The Marines returned fire and enveloped the position from the right. Results were 01 VC/NVA KI.(C); 01 USAC KIA and 03 USAC WIA.

At 1500H, 09 Nov 68, hike Company, while conducting a routine search during patrolling activities at vic of .T874899, discovered 01 homemade claywore mine 1x1 feet by 4 inches with rock and concrete explosive inside, 01 blasting cap non-electric pressure type, 1cc bottle of Atrophene, 01 bottle of Red Chinese medicine, 85lbs of rock salt, 500lbs of white rice and various documents. The rice was found under floors covered with 5 to 6 inches of dirt. 300lbs was found in one hooch, 100lbs in another, and 100lbs was found in still another. The rice and rock salt were destroyed by spreading it through a stream bed, the documents and medicine were turned over to S-2.

At 1230H, 10 Nov 68 in vic of AT863894, Nike Company discovered a complex of hooches which contained the following items: 03 RFG HE rounds, 01 Chi-Com grenade, 285 AK rounds, 10 non-electric blasting caps, and 10 electric blasting caps, 03 AK magazines, 01 canteen, 01 cartridge belt, 02 first aid pouches with accessories, assorted NVA clothing, 50 pounds of brown rice and assorted cooking utensils.

c. Treatment of Casualties, Avacuation, and Hospitalization
(1) All casualties were treated by company corpsmen and either returned to duty or evacuated to the Forward BAS vic AT929887 or BAS Rear at Dai La Pass. If extensive care was needed they were evacuated to 1st Hospital Co, 1st hedical Battalion, ASA Danang or hospital ships.

d. Pransportation

(1) Accomplished by organic motor transport assets and by direct support by 1st motor Transport Battalian.

e. Communications

(1) Redio. All internal and external radio nets were established utilizing a command LVT. A covered circuit was installed utilizing a KY-8 and a RT-524.

(2) <u>Pressage Center</u>. No field message center was established and a courier system was utilized with very good results. Pressage center

was maintained in the battalion rear.

(3) <u>Wire/Radio Relay</u>. A TRC-27 radio relay was established giving the Fire Base the ability to have access to the division wire system and to also maintain hot lines with the CCC/FSCC at Regiment. No internal wire was utilized at the Fire Base.

(4) <u>Maintenance</u>. All maintenance was accomplished at the battalion

reer.

f. Medical Evacuation.

(1) During Operation Nicollet Bay, the BAS operated out of facilities at the Fire Base vic AT929887 and Dai Le Pass.

(2) Patients requiring major surgery were evacuated to either 1st Hospital Company, 1st Redical Battalion, Danang, or hospital ships.


14. Special Equipment and Techniques.

a. During Operation Nicollet Bay, scout dogs were used during sweeps of the AO and found very useful in the dense terrain. Several of the Ambracs attached were used to house the FSCC and the COC and found to be convenient and adequate for this purpose.

15. Commander's Analysis.

a. Operation Nicollet Bay proved to be extremely valuable for the individual companies as it gave them the necessary experience required to operate in triple canopy jungle, and exposed them to the problems associated with this kind of an operation.

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- b. It is noted that the battalion's total enemy KIA count was 15 NVA; however, 12 of these occurred before the operation was assigned a name on 07 November 1968.
- c. Establishing a fire base on the edge of the assigned AU created communication, resupply and medevac problems, because of the distance the companies operated away from the fire base and the adverse weather conditions.

16. Recommendations.

The fire base should be established farther inside the AO in order to facilitate better control over the operating companies and to cover them with the organic weapons located within the fire base.

That the heavy tracked vehicles (LVT's) not be utilized within the fire base in the type of terrain encountered on Nicollet Bay because they can not get out into the AC to area where the fire base should be located.

The battalion CP should not be tied down with the amount of equipment that was established within the fire base due to the fact that it is too cumbersome, it cuts down the capability of the CP to move and it requires extra units to provide security for it that should be utilized to operate within the AO.


